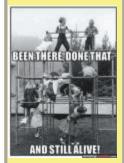

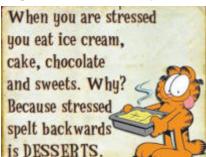
What's happening while we're closed: The Council on Aging's Kitchen & Dining Room

Mass Nursing Home Family Resource Line: 617-660-5399 open Every Day - 9:00 AM - 5:00 PM

The Executive Office of Health and Human Services has launched a Nursing Home Family Resource Line - a dedicated phone line to connect family members of nursing home and rest home residents with the information and resources needed. This new phone line provides one central contact for families and community members who have questions about the nursing home or rest home care their loved one is receiving during the COVID-19 outbreak.

The Nursing Home Family Resource Line is staffed from 9:00 AM - 5:00 PM, seven days a week. Staff will field questions on a range of topics and coordinate across state agencies to help provide answers.

These are unprecedented times and, understandably, families and community members have questions. We remain committed to providing relevant and timely information, and the Nursing Home Family Resource Line is another important resource.



"Sadly, the scams around coronavirus testing are spreading almost as fast as the virus itself," said Lucilia Prates-Ramos, the statewide director of the MA SMP program.

"Testing can only be ordered by a treating physician. We have heard about teams in white coats are going door-to-door offering virus testing. This is NOT a valid offer. What they are really interested in is robbing the elder or stealing their identity. We have heard reports of callers pretending to be a nurse offering test results once they get a credit card number.

These kinds of calls are also not for real.

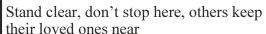

She makes us so happy and keeps us in shape, With the refrigerator near we won't gain any weight

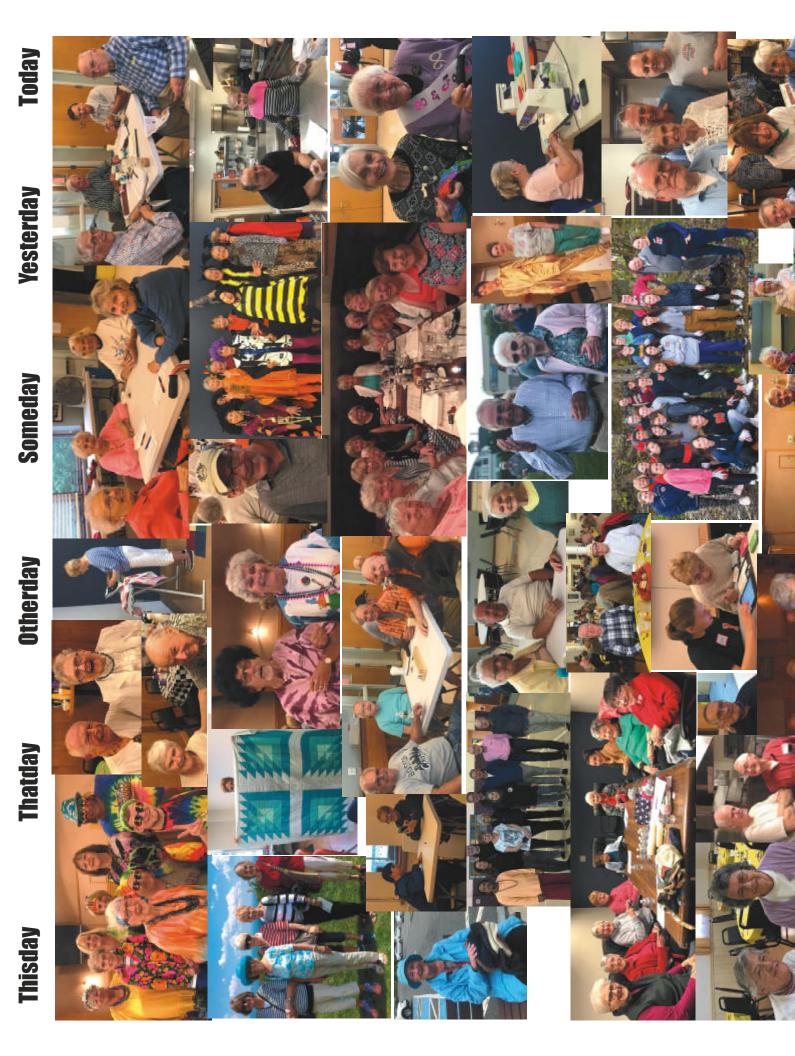
As much as she loves us the thing she most likes Is the handy mute button on her device.

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CALL SNAP DTA (Food Stamps) 1-833-712-8027 Direct hotline for seniors

- **1.** <u>How can I find out if I'm eligible for SNAP?</u> The fastest way to find out if you are eligible is to visit the DTAConnect Screening Tool. You can also apply online at DTAConnect.comor send a paper application.
- 2. <u>Will grocery stores still accept SNAP EBT cards during the COVID-19 pandemic?</u> Yes. Grocery stores will accept SNAP EBT cards if they are approved SNAP retailers. Most retailers have signs stating they accept SNAP or EBT.
- 3. What if I spend all my SNAP benefits before I get benefits again? Call the Project Bread FoodSource Hotline at 800-645-8333 (TTY: 1-800-377-1292) for other food resources. The hotline is open Monday- Friday: 8am 7pm and Saturday: 10am 2pm.
- **4.** <u>Am I going to get more SNAP benefits?</u> In response to COVID-19, you will get additional emergency SNAP benefits in April if you do not already get the maximum monthly amount and your household was approved prior to April 1, 2020. You will still receive your normal benefit amount in April. If eligible for emergency supplemental SNAP benefits, you will also receive the difference between what your normal issuance amount is and the maximum amount for your household size (e.g. if your normal allotment is \$150 and the maximum allotment for your household is \$194, you will receive \$44 in addition to the \$150 you receive, bringing you to a total of \$194 for the month). You can find the SNAP maximum benefit levels based on your household size
- 6. My family member is quarantined at home. Can I food shop for them with their EBT card? Any person included in your SNAP case can use your EBT card without telling DTA, as long as they have the PIN. Outside of your household members, only share your EBT card and PIN with a trusted family member or friend. If a family member or friend is going to shop for you regularly, you must give DTA signed, written permission telling us who will be shopping for you. You can submit this through the DTAConnect mobile app, by fax, or by mail.
- 7. My SNAP interim report/recertification is coming up, but DTA has not processed my paperwork yet. Will I lose my benefits? No. If your SNAP interim report or recertification is due in March, April or May it will be automatically extended. You do not need to take any action at this time, unless you want to make DTA aware of a change in your circumstances.

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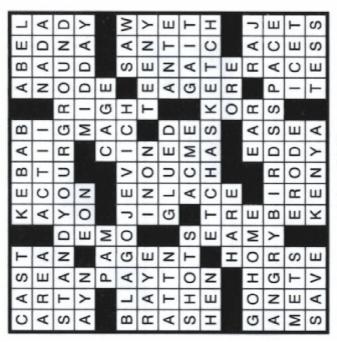
